

All India Radio to only be referred to as Akashvani: A brief history of the Indian public broadcaster

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The Parliament has recently passed the provisions of the Prasar Bharati Act, 1990.

About the provisions:

• The public broadcaster- **All India Radio** (AIR) will be exclusively referred to as **Akashvani** in all broadcasts and programmes.

History of the AIR before independence:

- **Guglielmo Marconi** sent out the **first** radio transmission in **1895**, but it took 2 decades for radio broadcasting to become **commercially** available.
- In India, the Radio Club of Bombay sent out the first commercial transmission in 1923.
- Later, the Calcutta Radio Club was started and then radio broadcasts reached Madras as the Madras Presidency Radio Club.
- The Indian Broadcasting Company (IBC) came into existence in 1927.
 - But it became bankrupt in 1930.
- In **1930**, the Indian State Broadcasting Service (**ISBS**) commenced its operations under the **Department of Industries and Labour**.
- Lionel Fielden was appointed as India's first Controller of Broadcasting in 1935.
- In 1936, ISBS became All India Radio and was brought under the Department of Communications.
- Later, AIR was brought under the **Department of Information and Broadcasting** which is now called the **Ministry of Information and Broadcasting** (under whose **jurisdiction** it remains till date).



History of AIR after independence:

- At the time of Independence, India had radio stations at Delhi, Lucknow, Bombay, Madras and Trichy.
- Jawaharlal Nehru's speech "Tryst with Destiny" was broadcasted at AIR in 1947.
- Frequency Modulation (FM) broadcasting began in 1977 in Chennai.

Current status of Akashvani:

- Today Akashvani has a network of over 262 radio stations, coverage of 92% of India's area and nearly all population.
- It broadcasts in 23 languages and 146 dialects.
- It has an External Services Division which broadcasts in 11 Indian and 16 foreign languages.
 - This helps reaching out to more than 100 countries.
- Its News Services Division broadcasts 647 bulletins daily for a total duration of nearly 56 hours.
- AIR 18 FM stereo channels, largely targets the urban audience.

History of nomenclature- Akashvani:

- The name Akashvani was adopted by AIR in 1956.
- It was used interchangeably with AIR, to refer to its Hindi broadcasting.
