

Badis limaakumi: A Chameleon fish

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A new **Badis fish** species called "*Badis limaakumi*" has recently been discovered in the **Milak river** of **Nagaland**.

About the Badis limaakumi:

- The Badis limaakumi is a fish that appears black in its natural habitat but undergoes color change when it is placed in a different environment.
- It is locally known as "**Tepdang**" or "**Akngashi** (Chungli)" or "**Aokngatsü** (Mongsen)" or "**Sempi**" etc.
- It is similar to the to **Badis assamensis** belonging to Assam as it had a dark black blotch on its gills.
 - The only difference between them is that Badis limaakumi completely lacked a series of blotches on the body, which is present in the Badis assamensis.
- The **Badis limaakumi** is one of the largest **Badis species**, the other being **Badis assamensis**.

Appearance:

- It has large and slender body.
- It has absence of blotches on sides, fins, and the cleithrum.
- It has many lateral-line scales.

About the Badis species:

- It is a genus of small freshwater fish belonging to the family Badidae.
- Fishes from the Badis species are also called Chameleon fish due to their ability to change colour rapidly when breeding, when wanting to blend into their surroundings or when they are stressed.
- There are about 25 recognized badis species in the world where 15 of them belongs to India.
- They are present throughout the **South Asia**, where it is commonly found in heavily vegetated **ditches**, **ponds**, slow-flowing **streams**, and **swamps**.
