## Defining who is 'Assamese': attempts, challenges

Recently, the Assamese government identified nearly 1.44 lakh illegal foreigners in assam until January 31, 2022.

## Foreigner under the Assam Accord:

- The **Assam Accord** was signed in 1985 by the **Centre and the Assam government** with the All-**Assam Student Union (AASU)** and the All Assam Gana Sangram Parishad.
- As per the Accord, anyone who had come to Assam **before midnight of March 24, 1971** would be an **Indian citizen**, while those who had come after would be dealt with as foreigners.

### Why is the definition of Assamese difficult?

- Assam's demography has been shaped by **decades of migration** dating back to the colonial era.
- A simple definition of Assamese people on the basis of language spoken **may exclude** someone whose family might have lived in Assam for 100 years.
- Axomiya or Assamese is a **contested phrase** and mean different to different sections of society.
  - Many feel people whose ancestors were living in Assam before 1826, when Assam was merged with British India, are Axomiya.
  - Others feel the word 'Axomiya' means anyone who were permanent residents of Assam before 1951, when the first NRC was drawn up.
  - Still others feel anyone speaking Assamese (or any other indigenous language) is an Axomiya.
  - People from Barak Valley, where Bengali is the local language, would want Bengalispeaking residents of Assam to be included as "Assamese".

#### Attempts to define Assamese people:



- In a **failed attempt in 2015**, then Assembly Speaker of Assam prepared a report proposing that '**Assamese people**' be anyone belonging to the state who:
  - Speaks the Assamese language or any tribal dialect of the state or local language of the region or;
  - Has been living in Assam since 1951 or earlier.
- A committee in 2020, recommended that any person of:
  - · Indigenous tribal community of Assam;
  - Any other indigenous community of Assam;
  - All other citizens of India residing in the territory or Assam on or before January 1, 1951 and:
  - **Descendants of these categories** would be considered Assamese.

#### Other terms for which no definition has been finalised:

## Khilonjia:

• It refers to all indigenous communities.

#### Adi Basinda:

- It refers to 'Original inhabitants', meaning the tribes who have lived for generations in Assam.
- This does not extend to tribal communities settled by the British during colonial rule, as even this is not a settled definition.
